



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Claytor Hosts ACF Screening with Q&A

On February 22, we hosted over a dozen individuals to watch Clear Day Thunder: Rescuing the American Chestnut, The American Chestnut Foundation's new documentary.

American Chestnut trees were abundant over 100 years ago: almost four billion of them existed along the east coast. They were one of the fastest growing and largest trees in the forests, living for up to 300 years and growing to 6 feet in diameter. The wood was rot resistant and used for making nearly everything. The chestnuts provided sustenance to humans and farm animals alike. In the late 1800s, a fungus was brought to the United States and killed the defenseless trees. While some trees still sprout from the old roots, they will eventually die of the blight. The American Chestnut Foundation is working to restore the American chestnut to its native range through research, education and restoration. Laura Podyma, ACF's Virginia Chapter volunteer, held a Q&A session after the screening and took some of us to the Claytor chestnut orchard to talk about what's going on there.

The orchard began in 2014, and in 2022, some of the trees produced burrs (seeds) for the first time. Those burrs were collected by Laura and taken back to ACF's research facilities to help develop an American chestnut that is resistant to the blight that killed hundreds of millions of these magnificent trees.

Over the years, many of the original trees in our orchard have died from Phytophthora, or root rot (a problem unrelated to the blight). ACF took soil samples from our orchard to determine if the orchard could be used as a testing site for growing potentially root rot resistant chestnut seedlings. The answer is yes and ACF will be planting new seedlings in the orchard this spring.
